What is Solar for All?

Solar for All will provide free or discounted solar installations to low-income and disadvantaged households! Congress created Solar for All in 2022 as part of the Inflation Reduction Act. It will help American households lower their electric bills with solar energy.

How can Solar for All benefit you?

If you live in a low-income or disadvantaged community you may be eligible to receive solar for free or at a discounted rate!

When will the Solar for All program launch?

The program should launch in mid-to-late 2025. If you are contacted by anyone asking you to sign up for the program before mid-to-late 2025, it is likely they are not actually affiliated with the Solar for All program.

Solar Consumer Awareness Quick Tips. What to watch for.

Be aware of aggressive door-to-door salespeople trying to push you to sign a solar contract! Predatory salespeople may:



Predatory salespeople may:

- Try to scare you into signing immediately by stating there is a special incentive, financing, or rebate for solar for a short period.
- Overstate the real value of solar or overestimate the utility bill increases over time to convince you to sign. Keep in mind, a typical payback period for solar in Pennsylvania is 8 - 12 years.
- Imply there is only one option or brand of solar system to buy.

You may also be approached online through advertisements. Solar advertisement scams may:

- Claim "program funding" is available "only in your area for a limited time."
- Suggest that the Federal Investment Tax Credit (ITC) for solar won't be available soon.
- Urge you to share your address, contact information, or utility bill to "see if you qualify." This information is then used by company sales staff to try and sell you a product or service.

What you can do to AVOID a Solar Scam:

- Do your research on the solar installers and reviews from former customers.
- Ask multiple installers for bids, don't stop your search at one installer.
- Don't sign a contract if you feel like you're being pressured or are uncomfortable about signing it.
